Message from the Principal

Dear Parents/Carers

It has come round to Open Evening once again and we are looking forward to greeting visitors next Wednesday 12th October with the Academy prepared to be looking at its best. To make preparations for the event, students will be leaving school early after lunch, ie at 1.50pm. The next morning we have a delayed start with school opening at 10.25am as the displays etc need to be dismantled and the school prepared for teaching. Please note that if you have no alternative regarding dropping children off early, we will be able to supervise students as from 8.45am.

I also wish to give advance notice that students will also be leaving school early on 2 occasions in November. On Wednesday 9th November, Year 11 have their GCSE Maths exam and in order to administrate that properly we need Years 7 to 10 to leave school at 1.10pm after an early lunch.

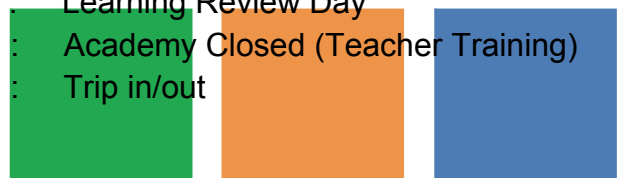
In the next week on Wednesday 16th November we have our Sixth Form Open Evening with a special programme of "taster lessons" in the afternoon for Year 11. Later we have an evening for parents to introduce our new facilities and hear about the wide range of courses available next year for our next Year 12 intake. I am sorry to cause disruption to the normal Academy week but we only make these decisions on rare occasions when special events require us to deploy staff appropriately. With the normal school week set at 27 hours, this is 2 hours longer than the average working week in UK schools. We are confident that any disruption to student learning is being kept to a minimum.

How Time Outs are Managed

The School has the legal right to give students a Time Out. There is no legal requirement for the school to receive parent's permission for the Time Out. We will attempt to call home but if a Parent/Carer has a particular concern regarding a Time Out they should contact the school. Staff will give a maximum of 60 minutes Time Out (detention) from Monday to Friday.

If a student is removed from a lesson due to poor behaviour, there is an automatic Time Out on the same day run by a member of ALT (Academy Leadership Team). Failure to attend this Time Out can lead to further sanctions including seclusion.

If students are logged 3 times for any of the PAUSE categories (Punctuality, Attitude, Uniform, Student Planner or Equipment) then they have a Time Out run by the Year Leader after school.

Students on Crutches

If your child is using crutches or has the need to use crutches in the future please call the Academy. We need to be aware of all pupils on crutches so we can keep an up to date list. We have to make sure they have assistance in the case of fire.

Annual Contribution - Student Fund

Carrying on our tradition into its fifth year, we have always been able to supplement your child's education with a number of "extras" that are made possible through a one-off payment of £30.00 at the start of the year. Not only do students benefit from the activities, but we make it convenient for you by avoiding lots of notes home and requests for small payments.

For the £30.00 this year the students will receive:

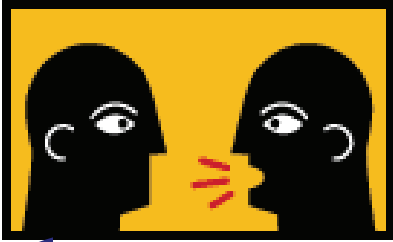
- Five fully-paid-for educational trips and visits

GCSE GEOGRAPHY FIELDTRIP - YEAR 11 - 2011

DESTINATION: Kingwood Overstrand, North Norfolk

DATES: 19th SEP – 23rd SEP

TASK: Controlled Assessment

Reflecting back on the 5 days I spent in Norfolk with the school and my friends, I am glad that I took part in the geography field trip. As this was the first day-and-night trip I was going with the school, I surely had high expectations of it- I wanted to have fun, I wanted to show my parents that I was independent and most importantly I wanted to make it one of my most memorable times at Oasis. After departing school on Monday morning, we headed straight to the place we were



going to spend the next five days. It was Kingswood, an Outdoor education and activity centre. At first glance, I fell in love with the place- it was beautiful, secluded and adventurous.

The aim of the field trip was to complete a coursework task which would form 15% of our geography grade and the fact that we only had five days to do this did seem daunting at the time. IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT THE YEAR 8 TRIP TO THE NATIONAL GALLERY

On Wednesday all of Year 8 will be travelling to the National Gallery. Students need to be in full uniform for this trip, including normal school shoes. Because there is classroom session in school before we leave, students must bring their normal school equipment with them, including planners, pens and pencils.

Because of the way that train times fall as we travel to and from the gallery, parents and students need to be aware of the following issues:

Re: Year 10 Revision & study skills day – Wednesday 5th October 2011

On Wednesday 5th October all Year 10 students will participate in a Revision and study skills day, in preparation for their Science GCSE Modular exam which takes place in January 2011 and for all forthcoming examinations over the next two years and beyond. The revision skills which will be taught to the students will be invaluable to their success at GCSE, as it will raise their attainment in all GCSE subjects.

The day will be based around different areas of revision and study skills, and students will go to seven different sessions throughout the day, learning different revision techniques, such as:

- How to use mind-mapping for structured revision.
- How to use music and drama to aid revision.
- Mind-mapping techniques.
- How to take meaningful notes and revision cards.
- How to use the internet as a valuable resource for revision.
- How to revise on your own and with a study buddy.
- How to set-up a Revision timetable.

Full school uniform is to be worn on the day, and also students are required to bring the correct equipment for the day (**planner**, pens, pencils, eraser, ruler etc).

Other schools which have held similar intense revision days have seen a real boost in GCSE grades in the past and I am sure our students will use the day appropriately to help improve their grades. To ensure students benefit from all of the day's events a good night sleep will be required the night before, and this will also help students arrive on time for the day. Students should be in school for an 8:45am start. School will finish at normal time, 4:00pm.

Lunch time will take place at the same time as normal, and school dinners will be available to buy, as if it is a normal school day.

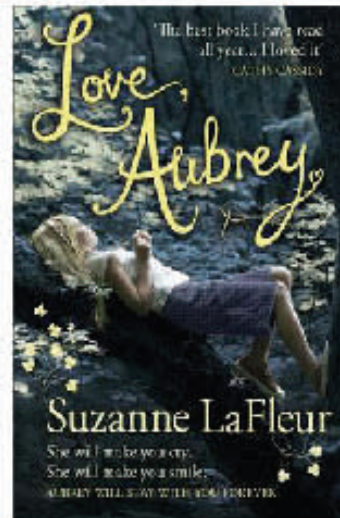

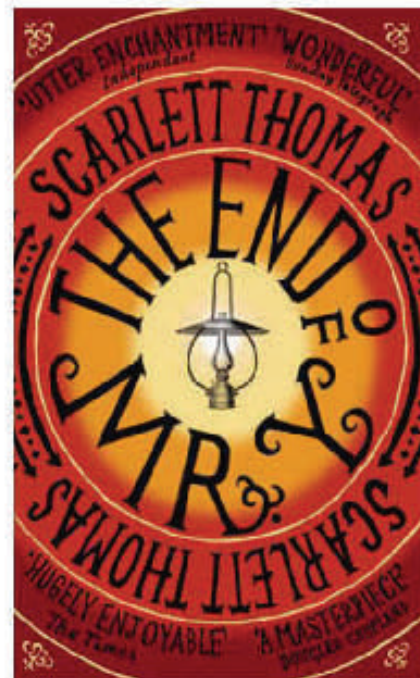

The End of Mr. Y is a captivating story about one person can who change humanity...

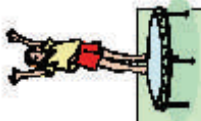

OASIS STAY AND PLAY SESSIONS

These sessions are play based groups which encourage parents, carers and children to explore new activities together. Children enjoy free play using a range of toys and equipment, a healthy snack, story and song times within the session.

The sessions also provide parents and carers with the opportunity to build social networks.

Through our snack times children learn to sit at the table while they eat, develop good table manners and social skills.

They know that they need to have clean hands before their snack is given out, they learn to sit nicely at the table, select their own food from a range of fruit and healthy snacks offered, to eat and drink from their own cups and bowls and to remain at the table until they have finished. The process is even followed by our toddlers who quickly learn and follow the boundaries, enjoying watching and copying the older children.
