We develop historical literacy through reading historical interpretations and sources aloud, and constructing arguments through extended writing tasks. We discuss key concepts with our peers to help embed key terms

AUTUMN - 2
Topic name: **Why did William win the Battle of Hastings in 1066?**
Why study this topic?
The year 1066 is one of the most important dates in British history. Through debates and discussions with your peers, you will be given the opportunity to construct an argument around why the Anglo-Saxons were defeated at the Battle of Hastings. You will also be able to connect causes of an event.

SPRING - 2
Topic name: **The Middle Ages**
Why study this topic?
You will learn about how major events during the middle ages had an impact on people's everyday lives. You will learn about the consequences, both good and bad, of events such as the Peasants Revolt and the Black Death.

SUMMER - 2
Topic name: **Stuarts & Civil War**
Why study this topic?
The English Civil War was a time where even your own neighbour could become your enemy! You will explore radical shifts in British history which resulted in a Civil War and the execution of King Charles I!

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AUTUMN - 1
Topic name: **What is history & Who lived in England 400-1066**
Why study this topic?
By gaining an understanding of the purpose of history, you will learn how history provides context and helps uncover the truth behind events. You will learn about the systems in place and the importance of migration. You will have contextual knowledge on what life was like before the Norman invasion of 1066, this will help you judge the extent of change and continuity in society.

SPRING - 1
Topic name: **Changes William introduced after 1066**
Why study this topic?
As a foreign ruler, William had the immense challenge of consolidating his power and ensuring the people of England accept him as their king. You will explore the process of change from Anglo-Saxon rule to Norman rule. You will learn how people's everyday lives were affected by changes to politics, the economy, religion, military, and society.

SUMMER - 1
Topic name: **Tudors**
Why study this topic?
You will explore the significance of each Tudor monarch and will be able to have a judgement on one of the most immersive periods in British history!
