

## ABC Links to literacy

We develop historical literacy through reading historical interpretations and sources aloud, and constructing arguments through extended writing tasks. We discuss key concepts with our peers to help embed key terms

### AUTUMN - 2

Topic name: **Norman Crime and Punishment**

Why study the topic?

You will explore the similarities and differences between Anglo-Saxon crime/punishment and Norman crime/punishment. This will then allow you to judge the extent of change/continuity experienced during the two time periods.

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### SPRING - 2

Topic name: **Early modern Crime and Punishment**

Why study this topic?

Ever wondered why fireworks are used all around the country on 5<sup>th</sup> November? Early modern crime and punishment will give you the opportunity to explore crime on a large scale, such as the Gunpowder Plot, and you will familiarise yourself with new definitions of crime such as heresy and treason

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### SUMMER - 2

Topic name: **Modern Crime and Punishment**

Why study this topic?

You will learn how definitions of crime experience change and how that impacts individuals in society. For example, how in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, the Criminal Justice Act gave courts new powers to issue more severe sentences for hate crime including for homophobic crimes.

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### AUTUMN - 1

Topic name: **Anglo-Saxon Crime and Punishment**

Why study the topic?

You will learn about the different types of crimes and punishments in Anglo-Saxon England. You will have the opportunity to compare these with modern England.

### SPRING - 1

Topic name: **Middle Ages Crime and Punishment**

Why study this topic?

You will learn about how law enforcement during the Middle Ages dealt with major developments and events during the Middle Ages such as the Black Death. You will form your own judgement on how society reacted to these changes.

### SUMMER - 1

Topic name: **Industrial Crime and Punishment**

Why study this topic?

You will learn why certain punishments became abolished and how changing attitudes in society impact law and order
